Message from our Principal

Dear Birchgrove families

It is amazing how quickly Term 2 has passed. It has been a full term with camp, playground works, incursions and sporting events.

Thank you to the staff who have been involved in organising all these events for our students.

Our attendance rates for term 2 have dropped from 94.7% in Term 1 to 92.5% this term, this is due to illness and students travelling during school time. A reminder that families are required to advise the school when their child is away, providing a reason for the absence.

Thank you to the families who have completed the 2026 school planning survey. We are required to submit projected enrolment numbers to the DoE in early August. The information gathered in the survey assists us with our future planning including staff and programs to be offered. If you have yet to complete the survey, please take a moment to fill in the required details.

We will also be submitting our NCCD data in early Term 3. NCCD refers to Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). Please refer to the information sheet (next page) about what data is collected and how it is used.

Playground works are expected to be completed by the end of the school holidays, ready for students return in Term 3.

Message from our Principal



Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- · formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- \cdot consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools

• develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.

Primary ETHICS

Could you or someone you know teach ethics at Birchgrove Public School in 2025?

A new volunteer is needed to teach the Stage 1 Australian Daisies ethics group. Ethics classes for this group will not continue until a new volunteer is available.

Teaching ethics is a wonderful volunteering opportunity for anyone looking for a meaningful way to give back to our community.

In ethics, students explore everyday issues suitable for their age. They learn to listen closely to each other, to disagree without putdowns and to think carefully as they form their opinions.

You can teach ethics if:

- You're interested in what children think and you have an interest in learning
- You're willing to learn how to use our lesson scripts to ask children ethical questions
- You can remain neutral and give the children space to think
- You're available each school week at 9:45am Friday
- You complete our free training and pass background checks

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents and carers

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

education.nsw.gov.au

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all Education in New South Wales is compulsion/for all children between the ages of sky vers and below the minimum school leaving age of 71 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and requirarly attend school or, are registered with the NSW Education Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time

- ensures that students do not miss out on mportant learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- · gives students time to greet their friends before class
- reduces classroom disruption.
- Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents

What if my child had to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include

- · Being sick, or having an infectious disease having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g.

NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances our child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Philops may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences au unius/field. as unjustified.

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is ne

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's other leftering.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regulary. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsor schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

Telephone interpreter service

Please contact the school if you would like more Please contact the school if you would like more information. If you need interpreter assistance to contact the school, please call \$3 +50, tell them what language you need and ask the operator to phone th school. The operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with your conversation. You will not be charged for this service.
